Saint Scholastica: Scholastica was the twin sister of Saint Benedict, the founder of Western monasticism, and she was the leader of a women's community likely located near Benedict's monastery at Monte Cassino. What little is known about her life is found in Saint Gregory the Great's book, the second *Dialogue*, which is an account of her brother's miracles. She died about 543 and was buried in Benedict's tomb, where he joined her in death soon after. She is the patron of nuns - especially Benedictines - and convulsive children.



Gospel Reflection: Jesus' power manifested in the great catch of fish brings Peter to confess his sinfulness. But the story does not stop with the confession of unworthiness, but continues with Peter who then "left everything and followed him." The appearance of God always reveals our own sinfulness, but God's focus is elsewhere—on our call and our mission. God sees humanity as created to be good, as persons who can choose to respond to God's call and fulfill the mission God gives. If we look for "large catches of fish" we will miss God's message. The gospel invites us to look to the simple manifestations of holiness that indicate the presence of God, for example, in the generosity of so many volunteers, in the faithfulness of husbands and wives, in the unselfishness of parish workers, in the uncomplaining suffering of the sick, in the gracious wisdom of the elderly. The "yes" response to our call is to imitate these good behaviors and by so doing we extend God's reign. (Living Liturgy, p.54)

Vincentian Meditation: The holiness of St. Vincent and of each one of us in the last analysis is a gift of God. The holiness of a saint is a sharing in the holiness of God Himself, and we recognize holiness when we see the fruits of the Holy Spirit in the life of a person. The fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self control. (McCullen, Deep Down Things, p.316)

Administrator's Corner

2025 Jubilee Year: A Celebration of Hope and Renewal

The year 2025 marks a significant milestone in the Church's calendar - the Jubilee Year. This special year is a time of great joy, forgiveness, and celebration, and is rooted in the Hebrew tradition. The word "Jubilee" comes from the Hebrew word yobel, which means horn. In the Hebrew tradition, every 50th year was set aside for the return of absent members to their households, the restoration of land to its owners, the release of Hebrew slaves, and the forgiveness of debts (Leviticus 25:10).

This tradition continued in Christianity, with Pope Boniface VIII proclaiming the first Christian jubilee in 1300. He declared that the jubilee will grant the full remission of sin for those who confessed their sins and made a pilgrimage to St. Peter's Basilica in Rome. Initially the Church celebrated jubilee years every 100 years. This was eventually shortened to every 50 years and then every 25 years. 2025 jubilee year began in Rome on 24th December 2024 and local dioceses on Holy family 29th December 2024 and will end at local dioceses on 28th December 2025 and in Rome January 6th 2026. As Pope Francis so eloquently puts it, "In the heart of each person, hope dwells as the desire and expectation of good things to come, despite our not knowing what the future may bring." (Spes Non Confundit) The Jubilee Year is a powerful reminder of the importance of hope in our lives and offers us a unique opportunity to renew our hope, to forgive and be forgiven, and to grow closer to God and to one another.

During this Jubilee Year, we are called to action. We are called to be signs of hope in the world, to work towards peace, to care for the poor, the sick, and the marginalized. We are called to be patient, to trust in God's goodness, and to wait with hope for the fulfillment of his promises.

One of the unique opportunities of the Jubilee Year is the chance to gain plenary indulgences for the forgiveness of sins. This can be done by making a pilgrimage to Rome or the Holy Land, participating in Eucharistic adoration and meditation, performing spiritual and corporal works of mercy, and praying for the Pope, the Church, and all those participating in the jubilee celebration.

As we celebrate the 2025 Jubilee Year, let us arise and shine, for God's favours are upon us. As the prophet Isaiah reminds us, "Arise and shine for God's favours are upon you" (Isaiah 60:1). May this Jubilee Year be a time of great joy, forgiveness, and celebration for all of us.
